

Set in the translucent, azure waters of the Arabian Sea, the Lakshadweep archipelago is rapidly acquiring recognition as a preferred scuba diving destination. Unblemished by most sourism, the pristine isles and submerged atolls are fringed and laced with an enthralling abundance of coral. Almost bewildering in its brilliance, this coral habitat is home to a thriving diversity of sea life. Submerged banks, caves, grottoes and sunken ship wrecks all combine to create a wondrous and exciting environment for the global scuba diving fraternity.

The Lakshadweep Administration was not slow to notice the vast potential of this aspect of tourism and threw its weight behind promoting and sustaining the growth of this adventure oriented sport. With an eye to bringing it abreast and possibly ahead of other world renowned diving destinations professional, infra-structural and support facilities and services are gradually and systematically being established to achieve future prominence.



The growing popularity of scuba diving as a global adventure sport was just the impetus needed for the Lakshadweep Diving Academy –LDA to initiate a professional academy in the islands. The LDA was established in 2012 and immediately affiliated itself to PADI (Professional Institute of Diving Instructors), the world's largest and most popular international diver training organisation. Funded by the Department of Tourism, the LDA embarked on a philanthropic programme, offering free scuba diving courses through various levels to local youth. The exercise was an unqualified success, leading to rewarding employment within the local community, the emergence of a thoroughly professional body of instructors to train and safeguard eager tourists and by default, to impart the message of environmental protection.

As early as 2013, the LDA was upgraded to PADI 5 Star Dive Resort status. Dive centres linked to the LDA at Kadmat. Minicoy. Kalpeni and Bangaram were also affiliated to PADI to ensure uniform linear standardisation. In 2015 LDA was elevated to PADI 5 Star Instructor Development Status, bringing with the authorisation to after and conduct PADI InstructorDevelopment courses. A short while later further recognition followed when the LDA received 5 Star Instructor Development Dive Resort designation in the PADI Dive Centre and Member Directory at the PADI web site.

In a move aimed at self-sustaining growth based on quality assurance, the LDA recently conducted its first ever instructor Development Course featuring the world's best Course Director and InstructorExaminers. The course produced 9 International Open Water Scuba Diving & EFR Instructors, 2 Assistant and EFR Instructors, 14 Dive Masters, 84 Rescue Divers, 100 Advanced Open Water Divers and 173 Open Water Divers. Additionally the LDA has blueprinted a PADI Instructor Development Course during the month of February 2015 focusing on 10 select candidates in order to sustain its growing need for qualifiedprofessionals to serve with the LDA and tits 4 subsidiary dive centres.













Situated roughly 400 kms, off the Indian coast from Kochi, Kavaratti forms the functional headquarters of the archipelagoa. The calin, franquil and relatively shallow waters of the lagoon are an ideal schooling zone for scuba diving initiates. The dive centre sits conveniently at the mouth of the atolion its northern tip, hosting a 10 bed resort and providing easy access to all major dive attractions.


The seas surrounding the island carry a dazzling diversity of sealife and each dive site boasts a unique undersea profile. Harbour Mouth at the gate of the atoll is home to giant sea fans, gargonian and giant triveli. Zing Zing Par toward the southern end is formidably reputed for its large sharks, spotted eagle rays and schools of barracuda. Coral in a kaleidoscope of brilliant colours, including flaming red, magnetically draw divers to Governors Reef. Moving northwest brings one to the awe inspiring caves punctuating the Wall of Wonder. There is opportunity too, to get up close and personal with widely varied furtles at Turtle Nest and for the brave hearted, close encounters of the scarier kind can be experienced at Windmill Point, where divers can witness grey reef sharks, spotted rays, batfish and grouper at close quarters.



















The second largest island in the Lakshadweep chain, Minicoy originally gained prominence as a centre for tuna fishing. Southernmost in geographical orientation, the island owes its growing reputation as a preferred dive site to the presence of three large shipwrecks in relatively shallow seas. One of the wrecks is believed to be the SS Hoechst and the unfortunate events that caused their sinking, probably led to the construction of a lighthouse as far back as 1885.

Wrecks have always proved a strong magnet for divers and the Minicoy trio are virtual underwater museums. The various species of sealife that abound in the waters around the wrecks are unusually large and the ferrous content leeching from the ruins are thought to be a likely agent of this mutation. Practically all dive sites on Minicoy claim manta ray sightings during September/October and January or February. Other exotic s pecies including shark, bull ray, turtles, jacks, red and black snapper, napoleon wrasse, barracuda, sweetlips giant sweet lips and humpback parrot fish are found in abundance at Bose Point, Murambu and Boduhavaligang.

Accommodation is covered in both A/C and NON A/C formats and may be pre-arranged at the purpose-built 20 bed and newly built resort in Minicoy.
